

Federal Building 302 Joplin

This building was built in 1903 and has served as the Post Office and the Federal Courts building.







Independent Building/Oollege Press 223 W. 3rd.

This plain brick building was built in 1912 to house the offices of the Independent Powder Co.

The company manufactured dynamite, which was needed for use in the mining and stone-quarrying industries. College Press renovated the building in 1991.



The Fox, built in 1930, is one of the finest examples of the architecture of the period. The building fell to disrepair but has been extensively renovated and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, since being purchased by Central Christian Center in 1974.




Frisco Building 601 Main

It may not look like it, but this high-rise was actually a train depot with offices on the upper floors. It was built in 1913.


Newman Building602 Main

Built in 1910, Newman's Department Store was considered the finest in Southwest Missouri. This building has been extensively renovated and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Christman's/Howsmon's 501 Main

Christman's opened for business in 1890 by Peter A. Christman and Edmund A Building. This building was torn down due to growth, and Christman's opened its new building in 1917. First Christian Church 4th & Pearl

This building was completed in 1901 at a cost of \$25,000. The church was designed in the Romanesque Revival style, which was popular at the time.



Liberty Building 4th & Main

The Liberty Building (Mercantile Bank), located at 4th & Main, was erected in 1924 and was so named because the lot on which it was built was a popular place for war bond rallies during World War I.
